



Victoria Time is university/distinguished professor and professor of criminal justice in the Department of Sociology and Criminal Justice at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia, U.S.A. Her education comprises two law degrees from the University of Yaounde, Cameroon; a Masters in Comparative Law from George Washington University Law School; a Masters in Justice, Law and Society from American University in Washington, D.C.; and a PhD in Criminology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

Her research endeavours to capture her various interests in comparative justice systems, contemporary legal issues, human rights, nation building, crimes of culture, and criminal law. She has published extensively in scholarly books, journal articles, book chapters, encyclopaedia entries, and others. Her first book titled *Shakespeare's Criminals: Criminology, Fiction, and Drama* portrays her interest in the English classics and criminological theories. Her second book titled *Women's Social and legal Issues in African Current Affairs* demonstrates her interest in human rights and crimes of culture while her third book, co-authored with the late W. Timothy Austin and titled *Comparative Justice: Off the Beaten Path*, examines the main families of law globally using two countries from different continents as samples. Some of her articles can be found in the *Journal of Criminal Justice*, *International Journal of Comparative and Applied Criminal Justice*, *Women and Criminal Justice*, *Social Justice*, *Journal of Ethnicity in Criminal Justice*, *Asian Journal of Criminology*, and a host of other journals.

Victoria Time has travelled extensively in the United States and worldwide to present her research at conferences and symposiums and to teach at foreign universities, such as the University of Kitakyushu (Japan) and Zhejiang University Guanghua Law School (China).
